Laurie Bertke

Laurie Bertke is a freelance multimedia storyteller who serves in a volunteer capacity as the webmaster and social media coordinator for S.A.V.E. Laurie helped S.A.V.E. redesign its website in 2021 and also served as editor of its quarterly newsletter from 2019-2022. She appreciates the unique role S.A.V.E. plays in the region as an organization committed to fostering the intersection of eco-spirituality with environmental sustainability and education.

A lifelong resident of northwest Ohio. Laurie has fond memories of attending environmental summer camps as a child with Linda Penn, a co-founder of S.A.V.E.. in the former Lourdes University Life Lab. The experience of raising caterpillars monarch through that program is one that stuck with her and over the past she several vears began raising and releasing monarchs with her own children



and developing a monarch-friendly habitat in her own backyard. When Laurie began working as a first grade aide at St. Patrick of Heatherdowns School last fall, she brought monarch caterpillars in to educate her class about the species. In addition, she assisted with a school-wide monarch butterfly tagging project that was conducted in partnership with the Toledo Zoo, which manages the urban prairie located on school grounds.

Laurie teaches early childhood religion at St. Pat's using a Montessori-based program known as the Catechesis of the Good Shepherd, and some of her favorite presentations are those which utilize imagery from the natural world to help children reflect on the deepest truths of their faith.

Outside of her full-time job at St. Pat's, Laurie works as a freelance writer, photographer and multimedia specialist. She graduated from Bowling Green State University in 2005 with a Bachelor of Fine Arts degree specializing in photography. From 2005-2015, she worked as a reporter for the former Catholic Chronicle of the Diocese of Toledo where she received several awards from the Catholic Press Association. She has most recently written for Toledo Area Parent, Toledo City Paper and Detroit Catholic.

Eco-Priend of the Environment Award

Dr. Richard Paat, MD

Dr. Richard Paat completed his undergraduate studies at The Ohio State University, his medical degree at the University of Toledo College of Medicine, and his Internal Medicine residency at Akron City Hospital. He then returned to Toledo in 1989 to practice medicine with his father, Dr. Antonio Paat.

As Chairman of medical missions for SCORE (Special Commission on Relief and Education), Dr. Paat has led 94 medical missions and disaster relief teams that have treated more than 137,000 patients around the world. Starting with his first medical mission in 1994, Dr. Paat has brought volunteer medical teams to the Philippines, Honduras, Guatemala, Haiti, and Tanzania. His teams have provided emergency care after earthquakes, tsunamis, hurricanes, and super typhoons in the Philippines, USA, Indonesia, Nepal, Honduras, Haiti, Puerto Rico, and the Bahamas. He recently brought three medical



relief teams into Ukraine this past April, June, and November assisting 1,000 displaced internally Ukrainians. whose lives were torn apart by the Russian invasion. His missions successfully partner with numerous groups, including churches, medical schools, the Rotary and Lions clubs, Catholic Charities, the Peace Corp, governments, and World Health Organization.

Dr. Paat's wife, Myra, and their 3 children have joined him on numerous missions. He has served as the volunteer medical director of a NGO that provides free surgical care for indigent children and was awarded a \$115,000 grant from the Gates Foundation to implement a Community Health Worker training program in Tanzania. This program now educates local villagers in Guatemala, Honduras, and Haiti, allowing basic medical care to exist even after his teams are gone. His mission teams implement clean water filtration programs and serve as ambassadors of goodwill throughout the world.

Over the last 17 years, Dr. Paat has provided free medical care to the uninsured and homeless of the Toledo area. He founded and runs the Community Care Free Medical Clinic and the Labre Street Clinic 3 days a week. In the summer, he organizes a mobile migrant worker clinic and in October, he runs the medical tent city for the homeless. During the Covid Pandemic, his teams vaccinated 7,000 people focusing on the Latinx, Black, AAPI, homeless, and migrant populations

Dr. Paat runs a full-time Internal Medicine practice in Toledo. He is a Clinical Professor of Medicine at the University of Toledo and is an Assistant Professor of Medicine at San Juan Bautista School of Medicine in Puerto Rico. He remains dedicated to educating health care students in humanistic qualities by actively involving them in his mission activities. Dr. Paat is the faculty advisor for the 2 largest service organizations at UT's medical school, Community Care Clinics and Students for Medical Missions. He has organized 15 international medical mission and 2 migrant worker healthcare conferences. He has trained and housed over 20 International physicians who then go back to serve in their own home country. He also mentors Catholic high school students in Toledo during their Senior Projects.

Dr. Paat and his wife Myra love to play volleyball. He coaches at Queen of Apostles school and runs the Toledo Starlings Volleyball club for socio-economically disadvantaged girls, teaching fitness, fighting childhood obesity, and instilling confidence in the lives of inner-city girls. His club helped kids from Mexico and Haiti obtain life-saving surgeries in Toledo. His Starlings team travelled to Haiti to help train their Jr. National Team and support a grade school. His team also partnered with a volleyball club in Yabucoa, Puerto Rico to play at the Starlings National Championships in San Diego.

Eco-School Award—Elementary

Maumee Valley Country Day School Forest School Inspired Program Toledo, OH

Outdoor education has been an integral part of a Maumee Valley Country Day School education for nearly 100 years. With 75 acres beyond its classroom doors, the campus offers space and opportunity for nature-based teaching to be a powerful component of the school-wide curriculum.

The curriculum at traditional Forest Schools is 100 percent focused on learner-led outdoor play that encourages curiosity and exploration. Children go outside in all weather conditions (with exceptions for only lightning and thunder). On any given day within the MV Lower School, you will see our youngest learners developing skills by climbing trees, swinging on vines, jumping in muddy rain puddles, or working together to scale hillsides.

Since the fall of 2018, the teachers transferred what they traditionally taught indoors to their outdoor classrooms. Pre-kindergarteners and junior kindergarteners explore their senses with various outdoor experiences, from sketching their observations of the same tree throughout the different seasons to listening to different bird calls. Kindergarteners learn math concepts as they count sticks for their campfire stories, use their weight to test the strength of vines and use



pinecones and acorns to patterns. Second make and third-grade students make sugar from the sweet sap of the maple tree during their unit titled "How Does Where We Live Impact How We Live?"

Each day, forest lessons conclude with a mindfulness experience called a "sit spot," where a student can observe nature, whether it is rushing water, plants, trees, or just the sun, wind, and clouds. It is solitary. When a sit spot concludes, students share what they noticed during their closing gratitude circle. As children spend more time outside, teachers hope they form a long-lasting connection with nature and become advocates for protecting it as they grow older.

Learning evolves along with the seasons, through snow, rain, sun and fallen leaves. Pre-kindergarten and junior kindergarten students are in the forest for up to three hours a day, while kindergarten through third-grade students are in the forest for up to three hours every Friday ("Forest School Fridays").

The Lower School also features a "Green Team" club for secondand third-grade students., which serves as a leadership opportunity. Students are responsible for educating peers on sustainability and recycling. To enrich its curriculum further, the MV Forest School partners with many northwest Ohio businesses and nonprofit groups, including Keep Toledo/Lucas County Beautiful, Metroparks Toledo, Toledo Grows, Nature's Nursery, MacQueen Orchards, area farms, and the Butterfly House.

Its evolution and ongoing success are made possible by the tireless efforts of these homeroom teachers and assistants: Amy Dankert, Sarah Ettore, Katie Gilsdorf, Heather Huhn, Alex Kania, Christine Marker, Renee Moebius, Emily Prater, Maggie Reed, Agustina Sanchez, and Kitty Weinberg. Leading the team is Michelle Thomas,

Head of Lower School. All 11 homeroom teachers, additional support staff, and Ms. Thomas are certified Forest School and Nature-Based teachers. Additionally, Mrs. Marker is also a certified National Geographic Educator.



Eco-School Award - Secondary

Aerospace and Natural Science Academy of Toledo Swanton, OH

The Aerospace and Natural Science Academy of Toledo, or ANSAT, is a magnet school of Toledo Public Schools that focuses on readying students for careers in Aviation or the Natural Sciences. Natural Science students can follow career pathways in animal science, urban agriculture and hydroponics, and wildlife and sustainability.

Environmentally concerned students will find careers in Natural Resources very rewarding. By studying wildlife and sus-



tainability, students are directly involved with managing and protecting the earth's environment. Students make an impact on protecting wildlife and educating the public. Located next to the Toledo Botanical Gardens, AN-SAT Natural Science work students with many community partners on conservation.

In addition to Wildlife and Sustainability, AN-SAT offers students pathways in urban agriculture, animal science, aviation maintenance technician, and pre-pilot/drone.

Annette Fink


Annette Fink was born into a large, Irish Catholic family in Jackson, Michigan. In her early career, she worked in the engineering field, doing design, drafting and HR work. For 35 years Annette has lived in Sylvania, Ohio, where she and her husband Kevin raised their three children. Annette also has two grand-children.

After returning to college as a nontraditional student, Annette graduated from Lourdes University, 2012, with her BA in studio art. Annette has followed her dream of becoming a freelance community artist making a variety of art, and ceramic murals, and donating the proceeds to local community causes. Her mural work, reflects nature, educates the viewer about our environment, and is filled with color and symbolism. Many of Annette's murals are located in downtown Toledo, at Manos Gar-

Eco-Educator Award (Higher Ed)

Todd Crail, Ph.D

Todd Crail, PhD, is a University Distinguished Lecturer in the Department of Environmental Sciences at the University of Toledo. He is an ecologist and naturalist covering broad topics from non-game fish and mussels to landscape management and orchid reintroduction. His focus is fostering undergraduate student engagement through field experiences both on campus and with the local conservation community to solve local envi-

ronmental issues. He works to employ inquiry and project-based learning through informal classroom environments to maximize the student's experience.

As part of this type of curriculum, he fostered the Greening UToledo Through Service organization (GUTS) grows, plants, and maintains native plant species in campus landscaping. The organization currently maintains 11 installations across campus with expressed desires from the University Administration and the Student Government to prioritize native plantings exclusively in future design concepts. He





views this type of work as rehabilitative to both the land and the humans within it. To that end, GUTS and UT Facilities have begun a partnership rehabilitating the neighboring Toledo Campus Ministry properties to provide additional opportunity, space, and community for the students who seek it.


Nightingales Harvest provides nutritious food, hygiene products, & resources to aid in improving the health and wellness of families experiencing cancer.

Community Building Award

The Luken T. Boyle Campaign for Kindness The Luken Boyle Family

After Luken took his life due to cyberbullying, it's become the Boyle family's mission to prevent this from happening to another family. We created the Luken T. Boyle Campaign for Kindness to teach children how to be kind in the face of adversity.

The work through our organization started with after-school and before-school programs to teach all facets of kindness and empathy. During Covid, our school programs had to be shut down. We then started creating Kindness Rooms in schools where students could create intentional acts of kindness by working together and creating positive bonds. We supply all the equipment needed and repair and/or paint the rooms as needed. The focus is first to be kind to themselves, then their family, school community, and community in general. We strive to improve mental health for all, especially our youth. Our program is geared for 5th through 12th graders.



Samantha Boyle speaks at schools and organizations to tell Luken's story about his life and death in the hope the students will gain the empathy and understanding to not be a bully or a victim. She stresses empathy and explains how words (written or spoken) have a big impact on the receiver. She

emphasizes how our words (in person or online) impact others and engages the students/audience to challenge themselves to be kind in all situations. She also speaks at community meetings when invited.

With Samantha as our community engagement person, Teresa as our Kindness Room coordinator, Mike as our builder for the Kindness Room supplies, and Bill as our emcee for our allies and videos, it is truly a family affair. We also have a board of directors who are very active with our mission. We are a 501c3 and receive monies to achieve our goal from individual donors and corporations who share the importance of spreading kindness to save lives.

We have a Kindness Rally every July 31 to remember Luken and celebrate his legacy. The Kindness Rally is at Hensville Park for two hours before a Mud Hens game, and then a large group attends the game after the Rally. This year it is on July 23 since the Mud Hens are out of town on Luken's anniversary.


Community Building Award




