After high school, he followed in his father Cleatus' footsteps and enlisted in the Navy for a six-year term. He tested and qualified for the elite Navy Nuclear Submarine Program. He served on the Nathanael Greene (a strategic nuclear ballistic submarine). After his honorable discharge, he completed his Master's Degree of Finance. He married Alison and together they have created and maintained (with the help of many along the way) Manos Community Garden since 2011.

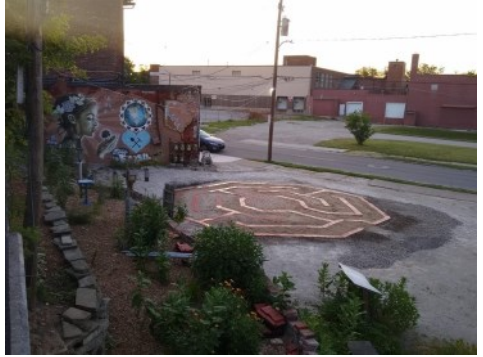
Alison Wood-Osmun is a native Toledoan. She learned how to garden and the magic of nature from her mother Alice in their backyard. She has an Associate Degree in Landscaping / Horticulture and a Bachelor of Science Degree. She interned at Toledo Botanical Garden eventually becoming the Perennial Garden Manager, Collections Curator and Plant Records Keeper and a regular contributor to TBG's quarterly magazine Cultivation writing about respecting and investing in nature.

She created and wrote a column for many years for Toledo City Paper which focused on enjoying and

appreciating the natural places throughout the area. For the past fifteen years, she has held the position of Toledo GROWs Community Garden Coordinator/Horticulturist where she joyfully works to help gardeners across the Toledo Metro area



create and manage community gardens. She encourages and provides them with information and tools which help to support pollinators and nature as well as to grow high quality produce.

Manos Community Garden serves as a community vegetable garden as well as a natural oasis in downtown Toledo. Not only does it supply the neighborhood gardeners with fresh produce but also those in need. The garden also supports urban birds with bird feeders and bird baths as well as pollinators with native flowering plants and artistic nature murals. The garden is part of the Cornell Urban Bird Study. Signage provides casual learning for those who visit the garden.

MCG also provides a respite for folks to commune with nature, to slow down and relax, to sit and listen to the birds, enjoy the flowering plants and walk the labyrinth. It further serves as a



land lab for the ecology students as well as a natural muse for the creative writing class at the Toledo School of the Arts. The Sharing Shack is the newest addition providing and delighting the neighborhood with food, books and small essentials.

Eco-School Award - Elementary

Ella P. Stewart Academy for Girls, Toledo

Mrs. Morris is a devoted wife, mother, and dedicated educator with 27 years of teaching experience. She currently serves as a 3rd-grade teacher at Ella P. Stewart Academy for Girls, the region's only all-girls public school, part of Toledo Public Schools. Since becoming an all-girls academy in 2003, Stewart Academy has empowered young women to lead with confidence, integrity, and excellence, fostering a sisterhood where every girl shines under the leadership of Principal Shannon Carter.



While Mrs. Morris's Wax Museum project may not focus directly on the environment, it powerfully reflects the values of ecology, sustainability, and spirituality that align with the mission of S.A.V.E. Through this project, her students research and honor African American women of influence — cultivating pride, purpose, and a sense of responsibility to uplift others. The poise and pride her students demonstrate exemplify the kind of holistic





education that inspires socially conscious, globally-minded leaders.

Mrs. Morris's nurturing approach, commitment to equity, and passion for inspiring young girls mirror S.A.V.E.'s core mission of valuing all life and promoting a just, sustainable world for future generations.



Eco-School Award - Secondary

Notre Dame High School Environmental Club

Notre Dame Academy is an all-girls Catholic high school located in Toledo. Throughout the years, NDA has strived to make the school environment more sustainable, and to develop a sense of environmental responsibility among all its students.

The Academy campus has made construction upgrades, including replacing single-pane windows with more energy-efficient double-pane windows, replacing older lights with LED lighting, and installing auto-dimming lights based on movement in some classrooms. NDA is excited to announce that a donor has offered funding to construct a greenhouse on campus next school year. All classes and students will be able to make use of it.

Curriculum-wise, the Academy offers an Environmental class on the Advanced Placement level, and a Biology class at the International Baccalaureate level. Both classes cover many topics related to sustainability. Science teacher Mr. Steve Coppens has started a vermicomposting bin (composting using worms) in his classroom. His classes have been working to clone and grow plants for distribution to class-





rooms, in order to increase the benefits of more greenery.

Throughout the school, Notre Dame heavily promotes reusable water bottles and has several bottle refilling stations. Many of the teachers try to reduce paper use by incorporating the students' iPads in their curriculum. Some individual classrooms have recycling bins, The school sponsors

a school uniform resale shop.

The NDA Environmental Club has a goal of making the Academy a greener and cleaner place, and to promote environmental consciousness among all the students. The Club's recent project was to repot plants grown in science class, and distribute them to other classrooms. (See photo)

I grew up on a farm with a large vegetable garden. As the oldest daughter of eight children, I often had the job of helping with the canning and preservation of food from that garden. After earning a degree in Music Education, I taught middle school for nine years before going on to receive a Master's degree in Educational Administration. I then served 14 years as an elementary school principal before deciding I was ready to move on to serve the community in a different way.

All of my past experiences provided a good foundation for my work at Toledo GROWs. I started here in 2013 as Program Manager – at a time when we were a program of Toledo Botanical Garden. In 2017 we became a stand-alone organization (TBG became part of the Metroparks System), and I took over

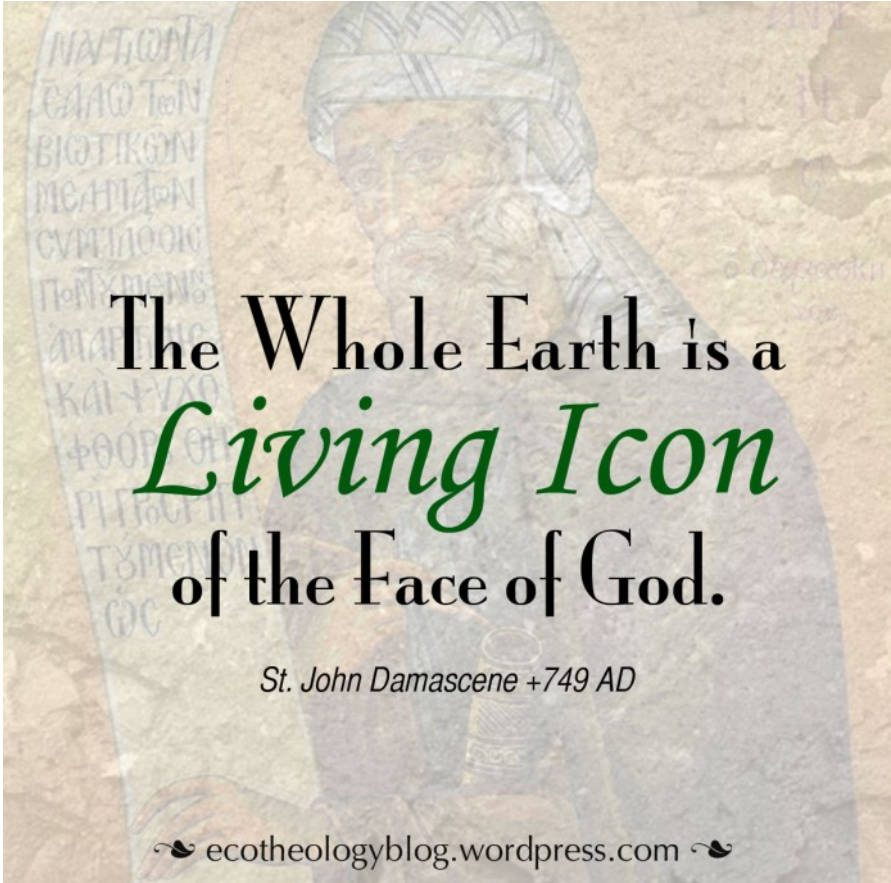
as the Executive Director. In this role, I oversee operations, management, and programs, while also serving as the chief fundraiser and community liaison.



At Toledo GROWs, we believe that all should have access to fresh, healthful food. As we provide support for 105 community gardens in and around the city, we remove barriers so all in our

community can have access. Our educational programs empower people of all ages to learn about growing and eating healthy food.

My husband Mark and I have two grown children who are as dedicated to working for social justice as we are. Mark and I enjoy traveling to spend time with our children, live music and theater, reading, and spending time with family and friends.



Eco-Educator Award (Elementary)

Lianne Genzman

Ottawa Hills Elementary School

Lianne Genzman is a fifth grade science teacher at Ottawa Hills Elementary School. On a regular basis, Lianne invites the Lucas Soil and Water Conservation District educational programming into her classroom. The LSWCD awarded her the Conservation Educator of the Year Award. She and her students are annual participants in the Toledo Metropolitan Area Council of Governments (TMACOG) Student Watershed Watch. Through the SWW, she partners with the Nature Conservancy to remove invasive species and discuss ways to improve the overall health of our watershed with her students.



When asked why she does what she does, Lianne said, “I love establishing partnerships with local groups to help my students see connections in the environment and their own backyard.”

Prior to teaching, Lianne worked as a Restoration Technician for two separate Conservation Authorities in Canada, and she is a founding member of the Lake Erie Islands Chapter of the Black

Swamp Conservancy. Her background includes an undergraduate degree in environmental science, a postgraduate degree in restoration ecology, and an additional masters degree in mathematics education.



Eco-Educator Award (Secondary)

Stacey Leffler Timberstone Junior High School

Stacey Leffler is a wife, mother of four, a 7th-grade science teacher at Timberstone Junior High, a cross-country coach, and a Sylvania Tree Commissioner. Her work and life reflect a deep commitment to environmental education, sustainability, and youth empowerment. Stacey believes that the best way to inspire students to care for the Earth is to immerse them in nature. Sylvan Prairie Park is adjacent to Timberstone, so Stacey regularly brings her students outdoors to observe and learn from the environment. In collaboration with Outdoor Sylvania, students explore the prairie marsh, collect water samples, identify native species, and collect seeds for propagation.

With guidance from The Nature Conservancy, Stacey Leffler's students receive training on ethical and effective seed collection techniques for species such as common milkweed, Indian grass, bergamot, coneflowers, rattlesnake master, and more, building awareness of pollinators, native habitats, and ecological balance. Some of these seeds, after being dried and cleaned, were sown in the new prairie plot installed by the Toledo Zoo on Timberstone's campus.



In 2022, when one of her students shared the news that Monarchs had been classified as an endangered species, Stacey recognized the importance of this issue. She decided to incorporate lessons about Monarch biology into

her curriculum. She emphasized the importance of milkweed in the butterfly's life cycle as well as the broader significance of pollinators in our ecosystem. The students then collected milkweed seeds from nearby Sylvan Prairie Park and prepared them to be distributed to the community and planted in their home landscapes. For her efforts in helping the endangered butterfly, Stacey Leffler was awarded a Natural Habitat Adventures Monarch Butterfly Scholarship Grant, which allowed her to travel to the monarch sanctuaries in Mexico—a life-changing experience that deepened her commitment to conservation. Since returning, she has shared her journey and the ecological insights she gained by giving talks throughout the community.

Along with Monarchs, Stacey Leffler has a passion for birds and makes it her mission to prepare her students for Northwest Ohio's "Biggest Week in Birding." Her students learn to identify birds by sight and sound, developing a deeper appreciation for the wildlife around them. Stacey feels that the more the students know about the plants and animals around them, the more they will feel compelled to protect them.

Timberstone had its first-ever Arbor Day celebration this year, led by Stacey Leffler. The 7th graders planted 12 trees in the newly minted Treestone Grove, and 325 seedlings were distributed to families and staff, further connecting the school community to long-term environmental care.

Whether planting trees, guiding students through native prairies, or inspiring future conservationists, Stacey Leffler's work exemplifies the powerful intersection of education, sustainability, and community engagement. Her hands-on, place-based approach to science education continues to cultivate a generation of environmentally conscious and empowered young people.

Under One Roof Food Pantry

Under One Roof is a food pantry located in Maumee, Ohio. Our mission is to eliminate hunger in our community through collaboration and engagement of community partners. Starting as a collection of emergency food items in the basement of St. Paul's Episcopal Church, it is now a collaborative effort involving seven partnering organizations: Calvary Church; Cass Road Baptist Church, First Church of Christ, Scientist; First Presbyterian Church; Mercy Health; St. Joseph's Catholic Church; and St. Paul's Episcopal Church. Using a shared leadership approach, each partner has committed to providing volunteers, food and hygiene donations, financial support and representation on our Advisory Committee. Over fifty volunteers work together to operate and maintain this non-profit endeavor. Committee members seek to engage the larger community in our mission by reaching out to schools, businesses, individuals and organizations to support our work.



We strive to create a welcoming environment for our clients who are served once a month by appointment. All clients meet the income eligibility requirements estab-



lished by Ohio Jobs and Family Services. Clients are allowed to choose perishable and non-perishable food and hygiene items from a well-stocked storefront. In addition to prepared foods, we encourage eco-friendly habits by offering fresh herbs and vegetables from our garden, supplying reusable cloth bags and encouraging recycling.

The pantry is open on Mondays and Thursdays with morning, afternoon and evening hours for the convenience of our customers. Medical screenings are periodically provided to our clients and volunteers by the Mercy Health team. Currently, with the support of our community, we are serving over 100 families/300 individuals per month.



Community Building Award

Olivia Holden

Olivia Holden is the Executive Director of ASSETS Toledo, a non-profit corporation that serves persons who are interested in starting a business or need the skills to continue in business, a position she has held since 2002.

ASSETS Toledo teaches the basics of setting up and running through a 13-week training course. To date over 5000 persons have attended the classes of which 89% have started their business and remain in business today.

Subsequent to coming to ASSETS Toledo she was Director of Minority Business Services at the Toledo Area Chamber of Commerce where she assisted minority business owners to become MBE certified, provided training, and raised awareness about minority businesses by working with Fortune 500 companies in order for them to obtain a working relationship.



Ms. Holden was a supervisor at the Ohio Civil Rights Commission, where she was responsible for the supervision of Field investigators, conducted fact finding hearings, and provided training for investigative staff.

She attended the University of Toledo, University of New York at

Albany majoring in nursing; Capital University, Columbus, OH, Certified Business Analyst; Notre Dame University, Certified Business Executive. She is also a mediator certified by the Supreme Court of Ohio.

Ms. Holden served on the Board of the Toledo Lucas County Seagate Convention Center and Huntington Center; Appointed by Governor Ted Strickland to the State of Ohio Minority Business Advisory Council; Unison Behavior Health Group Board member; University of Toledo Minority Incubator Board; University of Toledo MBE Diversity Council, and Commissioner for the Planning Commission for the City of Toledo and Lucas County. She is a member of Friendship Baptist Church.

Ms. Holden has over (5000) children of which two are her biological children, Kim and Rebekha along with 8 grandchildren and two great grandchildren.

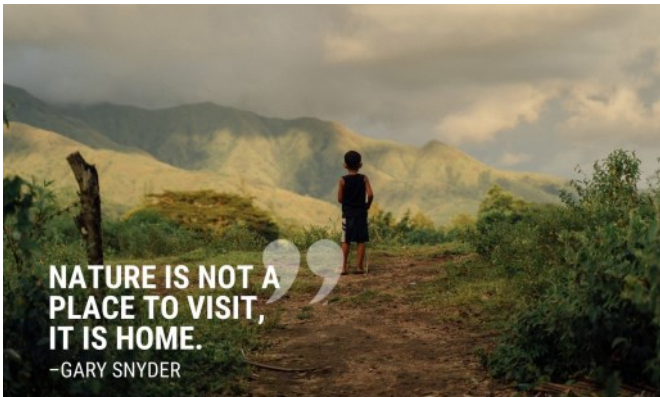

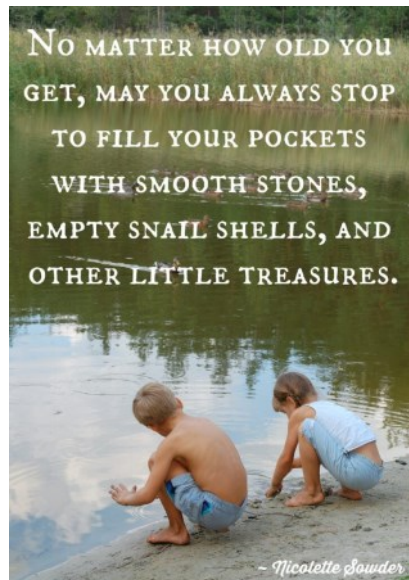

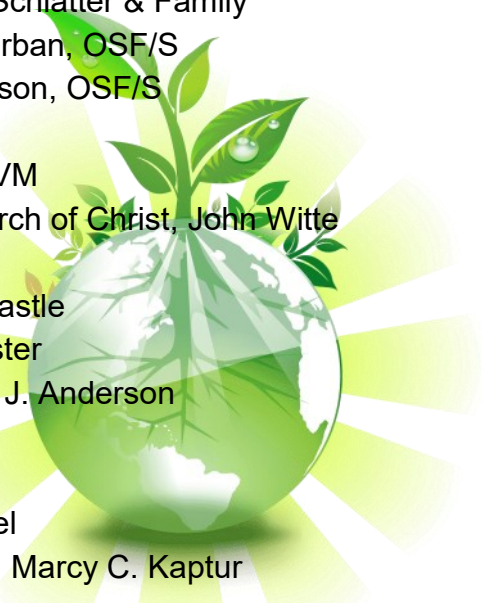
